




## WATER SOURCES

-  **Brushy Creek** Normally 6"-2' deep. The trail runs through a gravel bar here and signs can be washed out in floods, so consult the map and look for additional signs.  
**NOTE:** Brushy Creek is subject to flash flooding! Do not attempt to cross during swift high water!
-  **Gunnis Branch** Reliable water. Spring up stream. Nice area for a break.
-  **West Fork of the Black River** Crossing is on low-water bridge. Subject to flooding.

Remember to treat ALL water. You will find commercial water filters and chemical treatments at many outdoor/adventure/camping stores.

## TRAIL FEATURES AND NOTES

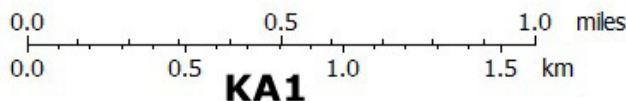
- A** Highway J trailhead. Park in cleared area at bend in road.
- B** The trail north of this point to the trailhead goes through a field, travels along a gravel road and through a gravel bar. Look for signs and consult a map while navigating.
- C** One of several trails that can be used to reach Brushy Creek Lodge. Look for signs with blue "L."
- D** Brushy Creek Lodge parking and trail access. This is private property and there may be a daily charge for parking. Please check in at the restaurant. Food, cabins and camping are available. Good place for a resupply drop-off.
- E** North terminus of road route past Sutton Bluff campground. Watch for vehicles on road. Consult a map and look for signs to navigate this 1/2 mile road trip.
- F** Swimming hole at base of bluff. Just off trail with gravel beach. Excellent spot to swim or take a break.
- G** Sutton Bluff trailhead. Located on 2236 about a half-mile from the low-water bridge. Short connector trail to OT.

## TRAIL FEATURES AND NOTES

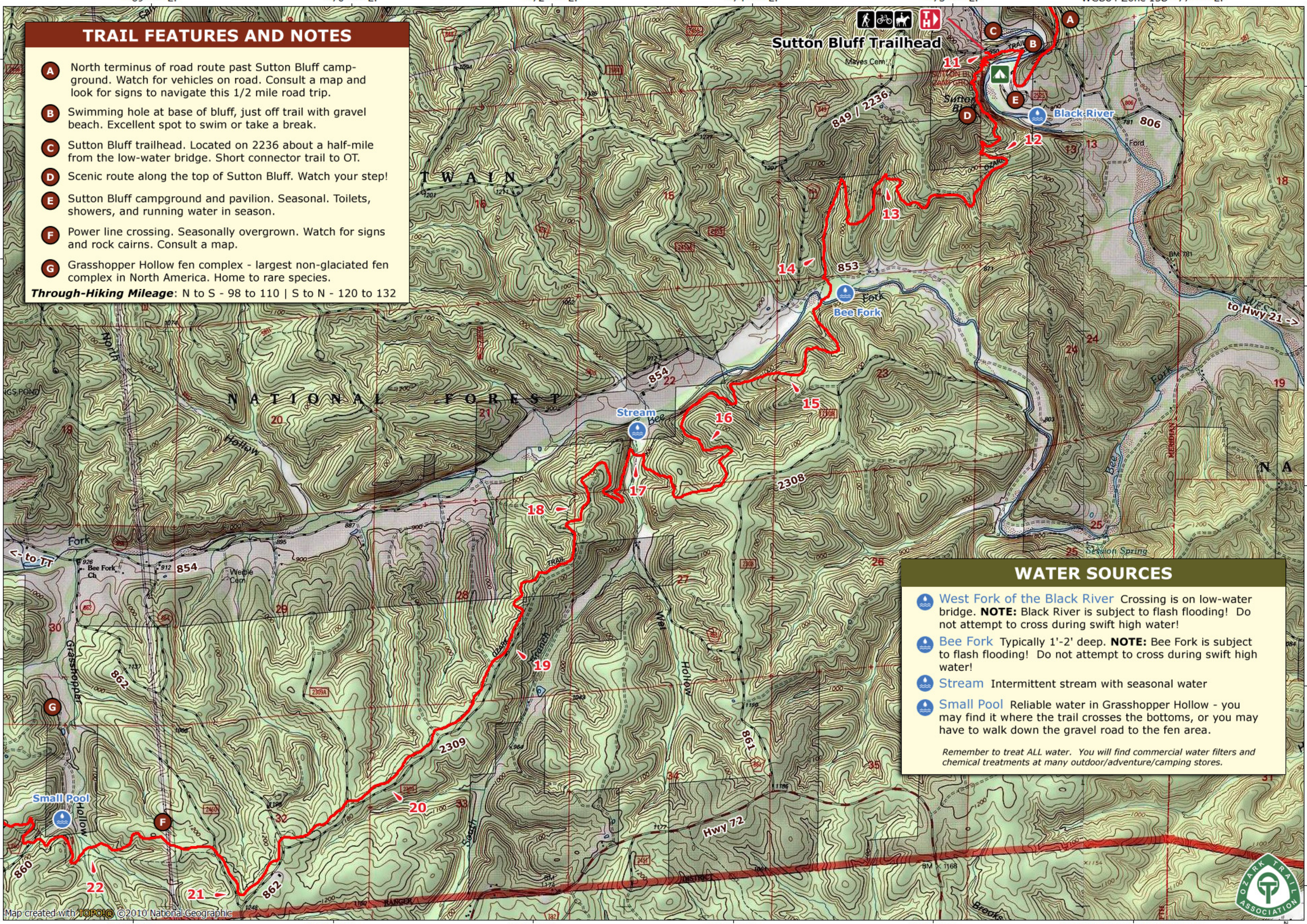
- A** North terminus of road route past Sutton Bluff campground. Watch for vehicles on road. Consult a map and look for signs to navigate this 1/2 mile road trip.
- B** Swimming hole at base of bluff, just off trail with gravel beach. Excellent spot to swim or take a break.
- C** Sutton Bluff trailhead. Located on 2236 about a half-mile from the low-water bridge. Short connector trail to OT.
- D** Scenic route along the top of Sutton Bluff. Watch your step!
- E** Sutton Bluff campground and pavilion. Seasonal. Toilets, showers, and running water in season.
- F** Power line crossing. Seasonally overgrown. Watch for signs and rock cairns. Consult a map.
- G** Grasshopper Hollow fen complex - largest non-glaciated fen complex in North America. Home to rare species.

**Through-Hiking Mileage:** N to S - 98 to 110 | S to N - 120 to 132

## WATER SOURCES

-  **West Fork of the Black River** Crossing is on low-water bridge. **NOTE:** Black River is subject to flash flooding! Do not attempt to cross during swift high water!
-  **Bee Fork** Typically 1'-2' deep. **NOTE:** Bee Fork is subject to flash flooding! Do not attempt to cross during swift high water!
-  **Stream** Intermittent stream with seasonal water
-  **Small Pool** Reliable water in Grasshopper Hollow - you may find it where the trail crosses the bottoms, or you may have to walk down the gravel road to the fen area.

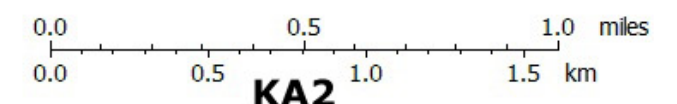
Remember to treat ALL water. You will find commercial water filters and chemical treatments at many outdoor/adventure/camping stores.

## WATER SOURCES

-  **Small Pool** Reliable water in Grasshopper Hollow - you may find it where the trail crosses the bottoms, or you may have to walk down the gravel road to the fen area.
-  **Stream** This unnamed intermittent stream is generally a good source of water except during droughts.

Remember to treat ALL water. You will find commercial water filters and chemical treatments at many outdoor/adventure/camping stores.

## TRAIL FEATURES AND NOTES

- A** Power line crossing. Seasonally overgrown. Watch for signs and rock cairns. Consult a map.
- B** Grasshopper Hollow fen complex - largest non-glaciated fen complex in North America. Home to rare species.
- C** This area has a number of logging roads and high ATV activity. Keep a sharp eye out for signs to avoid traveling down incorrect paths worn down by illegal ATV use.
- D** Highway P trailhead, located just south of Highway 72. Gravel lot on the east side of the road. The trail is located on the opposite side of the road. The Blair Creek section is to the south and the Karkaghne section to the east.
- E** North end of tram-line trail. This portion of the Blair Creek section is located on the bed of an old railroad tram built in the 1800s to transport pine logs from the Brushy Creek area.

**Through-Hiking Mileage:** N to S - 109 to 119 | S to N - 111 to 121
